

## **OCBC BANK STAFF REBUILD HOME FOR NEEDY FAMILY IN KELANTAN**

Kota Bharu, Kelantan 10 June 2010 – The home of a needy family in Pasir Mas recently underwent long-overdue upgrading thanks to the efforts of 35 staff of OCBC Bank (Malaysia) Berhad's Operations & Technology Division.

The Kuala Lumpur-based volunteers flew to Kelantan on their own time and expense last weekend to participate in the community development initiative to repair and reconstruct a disabled-friendly home.

The initiative was undertaken in partnership with Habitat for Humanity Malaysia and Yayasan Orang Kurang Upaya Kelantan (YOKUK). The cost of RM30,000 for building materials and other items for two houses, the first of which was completed last weekend, came from fund raising efforts by the staff of the Bank.

According to OCBC Bank's Head of Operations, Mr Lim Yau Seong, although the volunteers were not skilled builders nor contractors, they were able to carry out the required tasks with ease under the guidance of skilled personnel from Kelantan.

"The activities included site clearing, concrete and bricks laying as well as wall painting. I am pleased to say the participation quickly became more than a community effort on our part. We were ourselves learning as we rendered assistance to our newfound friends in Kelantan," he said.

The beneficiary family was all smiles when the project was completed and thanked the Bank for the effort.

The beneficiary, Puan Siti Faridah, 44, lives with her husband, 5 children and a niece. Her husband works as a labourer and she is a full-time housewife. Currently his meager income is supplemented by assistance from the Social Welfare Department. The house was in a dilapidated condition without any bathroom and the floor boards were destroyed by termites.

So, Habitat for Humanity planned a series of renovation exercises for the OCBC volunteers – reinforcing the walls, partitioning the bedroom and kitchen, and constructing a combined bathroom/toilet at the back of the house.

A beaming Puan Siti said: “I now have a comfortable house that is stable and which I can truly call home. I was so honoured that all of these volunteers came to help speed up the process.”

Commenting on the overall effort, Mr Lim Yau Seong said: “We are pleased to have been able to contribute, in a small way, towards the future of our needy friends. This is the least we could do for our brethren in other parts of the country.”

Earlier this year, the O&T Division organised a charity fair to finance a number of projects as part of their corporate social responsibility effort, raising RM60,000 in the process.
